The UDP party officers met today to consider the proposals for political progress presented by the British and Irish governments and the subsequent statement from the IRA.

The UDP has a number of areas of concern that should be addressed, particularly in relation to the IRA position. Some of these issues are as follows;

- 1. The IRA statement does not signal that the IRA has removed the option of force. Is its war now over?
- 2. The IRA statement is unclear on whether the proposed inspection of selected arms dumps represents the IRA's definition of its arms being put beyond use.
- 3. It has been projected from some quarters that the IRA agreement to put its arms beyond use is an agreement to destroy its weapons as part of a process. If this is not the case, a government formed under false expectations would not maintain public confidence.

The UDP has concluded that as it stands the initiative is not a basis for establishing a durable government. Until the UDP's concerns are satisfactorily addressed we are unable to make a final response to the British government.
