I dissent from the recommendation of the majority report in regard to section 21 and recommend that it do not pass, for the following reasons: First, because I believe the creation of the commission contemplated, probably with the extraordinary powers conferred upon it, to supervise and regulate the affairs of individuals or associations of individuals engaged in certain specified lines of lawful business to the exclusion of others, is discriminating, arbitrary and unjust in the extreme, and in violation of the fundamental principles of free government.

Second, that the powers conferred upon said commission, to create, modify and amend laws, to regulate and control all railroads, canals, and other transportation companies, associations and corporations, to regulate the rates of common carriers, and in the absence of legislation upon the subject, to regulate and fix the rates of such carriers, are in themselves a usurpation of the powers of the legislature, and in the hands of the commission, a delegation of the powers of the state to a body of men who are not responsible to the people.
