The new State Capital will probably be at North Yakima

(Spokane Falls Re iew.)

The best and most extensive agri-ultural region in the Yakima Land District and in the Territory, lies about the City of North Yakima and is known as the Yakima Valley.

To-day, where four years ago were uncultivated prairies, the home of great herds of unrestrained wild cattle and vicious bands of cayuse ponies who knew no balter, now stands the City of North Yakima, the Queen of Eastern Washington. (Nor.hwest Magazine.)
