County Commissioners' Proceedings.

COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE. CHEYENNE, Laramie County, W. T., Monday, August 19, 1889. The board of county commissioners met in special session this day at 10 o'clock a.m. Present: Geo. W. Hoyt chairman, T. Dyer and John Morrison commissioners.

The clerk submitted the certificate of the territorial auditor showing the assessment for Laramie county made by the territorial board of equalization on the property of corporations for the year 1889 under the provision of section 3839 revised statutes of Wyoming.

On motion it is ordered that Dr. Wyman be appointed county physician for Laramie county from October 1, 1889, until further notice at a salary of \$75 per month.

On motion the board adjourned until Monday, Sept. 2, 1889. MONDAY, Sept. 2, 1889. The board of county commissioners met this day at 2 o'clock pursuant to adjournment. Present: Geo. W. Hoyt, chairman, and T. Dyer, commissioner.

The board proceeded to divide and adjust the number of miles of Union Pacific railway and Western Union telegraph and the amounts of same falling within each precinct, township or school district in Laramie county as follows:

School District No. 1. Union Pacific Railway company: 32.03 miles at \$9,640.00 per mile, \$308,769.20.

Western Union Telegraph company: 6 miles, 7 wire at \$224, \$1,344.00. 15.01 miles, 7 wire at \$182, \$2,731.82.

School District No. 2. Western Union Telegraph company: 52.04 miles, 1 wire at \$36, \$1,873.44.

Western Union Telegraph Co.: 9.98 miles, one wire, at \$36 per mile, \$359.28.

On motion it is ordered by the board that the following levy of taxes be levied and assessed upon the taxable real and personal property and upon the assessed valuation thereof as shown by the assessment roll of Laramie county for the year 1889 including the valuation of the property of railway and telegraph companies returned to them for the various purposes and in proportion as follows to-wit:

For territorial general fund 3 mills on the dollar. For university income tax 1/4 mills on the dollar. For territorial bond .6 mills on the dollar.

For support poor and pauper 2 mills on the dollar. For roads and bridges 1 mill on the dollar. For expense district court 2 mills on the dollar.

For support common schools 2 mills on the dollar. For maintenance of public library .2 mills on the dollar.

School district No. 9, 5.6 mills on the dollar. School district No. 11, 5 mills on the dollar.

The clerk was instructed to extend the above amounts against the property of respective districts in making out the annual tax list.

On motion it is ordered that the bonds of the treasurers of the several school districts be fixed at the following amounts respectively, to-wit:

School district No. 1, \$3,500.00. School district No. 2, \$5,800.00. School district No. 3, \$4,300.00. School district No. 4, \$2,800.00.

School district No. 5, \$3,200.00. School district No. 6, \$900.00. School district No. 7, \$1,800.00.

School district No. 8, \$1,200.00. School district No. 9, \$3,700.00. School district No. 11, \$800.00.

On motion the board adjourned. TUESDAY, Sept. 3, 1889. The board of county commissioners met this day in regular session at 10 o'clock a.m. Present: Geo. W. Hoyt, chairman, and T. Dyer, commissioner.
