

LEAVE IT TO THE LEGISLATURE.
Stiles was opposed to incorporating such a principle in the constitution. "The fact has been set up here that twenty-one states have established commissions. Of these twenty are created by legislature and one by a constitution. Now why cannot we leave this matter to our legislature? California is the state that has a constitutional commission.
