BISMARCK, July 31.—There is a promise now that the constitutional convention will close its labors by Aug. 10th. Such is the general sentiment among the members, and earnest efforts are being made with that end in view. The work of the standing committees is not yet wholly completed, but the articles are being reported fast enough to keep the convention busy. As a general thing two or three articles will be adopted each day, and there are only four or five all day debates in prospect. Woman suffrage, the Australian system of voting, public institutions and corporation restrictions are among the subjects which will occupy some considerable time. The legislative and judicial apportionment may cause some debate, but the belief is that the opinions of the members are so well settled that the discussion will not be protracted. The fifth week of the convention proceedings will expire Aug. 8th, and the expense at that time will be in the neighborhood of \$30,000.


