## There Will be Plenty of Ore.

He did not seem to have much faith in smelters or mines, as he said Dennis Ryan, who was supposed to know more about mines than any one, had built a smelter at Tacoma, which is idle, and likely to remain so, as the mine Mr. Ryan has at Coeur d'Alene, and on which he built an extensive mill, proved to be no good, or words to that effect; and, after being worked a week or so, was closed down and remains closed. Mr. Ryan may have made a mistake in mining and smelting, but it is no sign of a duck's nest to see a teacher on a stump, and it does not follow that the smelter here will not be a success. Portland capitalists own enough mines in the Coeur d'Alene to keep several or more smelters running, and the smelter here is not likely to lie idle.—Oregonian.

## CONVENTION JURY SYSTEM.

On reaching the section providing that in civil actions three fourths of a jury may render a verdict, Mr. Reid moved to amend by adding by "consent of parties." Mr. Reid thought the convention should be cautious in meddling with the old and hoary system of jury trial.

Mr. Claggett replied. He was not to be frightened from looking facts of daily and large moment squarely in the face on account of the hoary age of any institution. The old idea of the necessity of an agreement of twelve men in the jury box has long since exploded. Several of the Western States had adopted the modification here proposed with good result in every instance. It had grown into a custom for rich corporations, or proud and rich parties, to put bought men into the jury box for the purpose of hanging juries, and so prevented justice. "Hanging juries," by the corruption, or the stupidity of a single man, or enforced compromises through the presence of such men on the panel, were crippling our courts, denying justice to worthy parties, and piling taxes upon the counties. He believed that the Convention would have no more important question before it, and he hoped that it would be boldly met. The people are complaining of the delay and the expense of the courts. Justice is almost denied the people and it is quite beyond the reach of the poor. The great trouble he believed was in the jury box. And it was to be met and conquered by robbing the stupid blockheads and corrupt villains of their power longer to hang the jury of the county.

Mr. Heyburn moved to amend the suggested amendment by striking from the section all that proposed any modification of the old doctrine of the necessity of an agreement of twelve men.

Mr. Reid accepted the amendment and both, Messrs. Reid and Heyburn, addressed the convention in eloquent eulogy of the old-fashion jury system.

Mr. Claggett replied with great spirit, and expressed his regret that gentlemen of the profession should be so ready to come forward to defend this great abuse of our judiciary system and defeat this slight attempt at reform, and said he was fearful that the people might by and by begin to think that the great remedy needed was to the dispensation of justice between man and man would have to be broad enough to reach the profession itself. [Applause by the convention and the gallery].—Statesman.

## IDAHO CONVENTION.

Still hammering away at a Constitutional—Speeches

Boise City, July 16—The constitutional convention to day considering the bill of rights. King of Shoshone county moved to strike out so much of the section upon liberty of conscience as specially relates to polygamy, arguing that licentious practices are never defended on religious grounds. The motion was rejected without division. Ainslee, (democrat), of Boise county, offered an additional sentence, as follows: "Bigamy and polygamy are forever prohibited in this state. The legislative assembly shall provide by law for the punishment of such crimes." Adopted on motion of Clark, democrat, of Ada county. The section forbidding compulsory payments for the support of churches was amended by inserting "or pay tithes." The remainder of the session was devoted to a consideration of the section permitting a verdict by nine jurors out of twelve. Eloquent Judge Claggett, republican, of Shoshone county, made a magnificent speech in favor of the proposition. J. W. Reed, democrat, of Nez Perce county, opposed it with great effect. Without taking a vote the convention adjourned to Wednesday morning. Mrs. Dunaway, by invitation, addressed the convention on woman suffrage this evening.

The Salt Lake Tribune is getting so nervous about the Idaho constitutional convention concerning the Mormon question that it is prompted to remark in a long editorial on Idaho:

"There are just as many sneaks in the republican as the democratic party, and the men who control the Mormon organization never sleep, never rest and, if possibly, never lose a point. If they could make the same terms with republicans in the east that they did with democrats two years ago, they would all be republicans to-morrow, for they can change their politics quicker than an ordinary man can change his shirt."

We had almost concluded that the republicans in Idaho were Saints to be immortalized; but now the illusion is dispelled. There must be something wrong south of the 46th parallel.

"There are just now as many republican sneaks," etc., means something. Are the republican leaders hobnobbing a little too much with the hierarchy to suit the Tribune? Heavens forbid that the great moral preachers should play the Sloggers game again and capture the Mormons bag and baggage. It may do some of the newcomers of North Idaho of the Republican persuasion good to find that the party is not so terribly foreign Mercurionism as it was last fall. Two Senators and a Representative may be involved. A Mormon vote counts as much as a colored vote when it is cast on the republican side of the house.—Sun.

## CATTLE FOR EUROPE.

CHICAGO, July 15.—Arrangements have been completed for the exportation of an unusually large number of cattle within the next three or four months. Nelson Morris, a heavy cattle dealer of this city, has secured all the vacant space on all the outgoing steamers from New York for Liverpool, Glasgow and London for a period of two or three months. J. L. Hataway, of Boston, and his syndicate have engaged all the room on the steamers of the Warren line from Boston for July, August and September, and Meyer Goldsmith, of New York, has engaged the same line of steamers for October. The reason for this heavy export is the low price here and the shortage of European cattle crops, and the consequent high price there. The first consignment of this season of range cattle arrived this morning. They are from the ranch of Pierre Wilbeaux, of Dawson county, Montana, and consisting of nine car-loads of steers and six carloads of cows. They were shipped at Mingsville, Montana.

## THE JURY REFORM.

Now it is not an easy matter to corrupt two or three men of a jury. With numbers there is danger of exposure. So has developed the idea of meeting this evil by allowing the verdict of nine men to be the verdict of the jury. The suggestion is wise. It is found to work well in several states where attempted. It is proposed to place this safeguard in our own constitution. Two young men of whom we had hoped better things. Two young, intelligent, generous spirited members of the legal profession. Two men of the convention, of whom their respective parties were hoping great things, rise in their places, yesterday, and with eloquent, though not wise words oppose this most important reform. These gentlemen should know that no amount of eloquent eulogy of the old English jury system can cover up the sight or stench of facts festering and rotting in the gaze and in the nostrils of every man acquainted with the courts of the day. We trust that the intelligent convention will not be moved from its mooring by the high wind of these young attorneys. But rather that they will take counsel of that older and wiser man of the profession, who yesterday so brilliantly swept away all their specious arguments—selected all their rattling musketry by staunch fact and solid argument—fact and argument as unanswerable as the multiplication table. Whatever may be the result of the debate in this convention, the people of Idaho—the payers of taxes and the lovers of justice between man and man—will remember Judge Claggett's speeches of yesterday with grateful regard.—Boise Statesman.
