Brittsh Columbia Loses One of Her Brightest M

Hon. A. E. B. Davie, pre-British Columbia, died in Victoria August 1. For some years his health had not been good, and for the last two years he had been unable to take an active part in public affairs. On the recommendation of his physician sev-

recommendation of his physician sev-eral changes of climate .were tried in 1887, and again in 1888, but while the temporary results were good, no per-manent cure was effected. Mr. Davie's system was exhausted, and he gradu-ally sank until he succumbed to the ravages of consumption. The follow-ing from the Colonist gives the record of his particularly useful life: Mon. A. E. B. Davie was born in Somersetshire, England, in 1846, and came to this country in 1862 with his father. He was educated at Silcoate's school, near Wakefield, Garkshire. 


