The Constitutional Convention adjourned sine die Tuesday afternoon.

 The stamp mill at Era will begin operations about September 1st.

 The National Bank at Boise City, on adjournment, cashed the per diem and mileage certificates of the members of the convention at 75 cents on the dollar.

 The opening of the Anderson bridge has been a benefit to Eagle Rock, and it is thought that the increase of trade to Anderson Bros. alone will compensate them for the toll they have missed.

 The Boise correspondent of the Salt Lake Herald keeps writing to his paper that the convention is ready to break up in a row, and still the convention meets and adjourns every day.
 The canal meeting Saturday afternoon at Fox's school house was well attended, and sufficient stock was taken to insure the canal. This will be one of the largest canals taken from Snake river south of Eagle Rock. This was a business meeting that meant business. Good.
 OPH FOR THE PARK.—Mrs. Stull, Misses McConnell, Brooks, Murphy and Morgan and Mr. Stull, Sr., and Ralph Morgan left overland for the National Park Thursday. Besides seeing the wonders they expect a good time generally.
 Sullivan and Kilrain will now have to fight a Mississippi court for fighting one another on Mississippi soil. Sullivan is there under arrest and Kilrain is on his way there.
 At Monday's election in Utah the Liberals won a famous victory in Ogden and Salt Lake. J. N. Kimball, well known in all Idaho, was elected to the legislature from Ogden, but Kentucky Smith was defeated for the council by a small majority.
 Judge Warriner, probate judge of Boise county mysteriously disappeared June 17th. He was old, weak and infirm. Search was made but nothing could be learned of him. This week his remains were found in a dry gulch near Banner. It is thought there were two feet of water in the gulch at the time and that he fell in and was drowned.
 Bingham county is the largest county in the territory; it has more miles of railroad than any county; it has more water streams and longer streams than any county; it is rich in minerals; it has as fine scenery as any county and it has the best mineral springs in all the west.
 Col. Hannaford, of Pocatello, who was arrested for selling liquor on the Indian reservation, was taken before Judge Berry under a writ of habeas corpus and released. This matter settles the townsite question so far as the court is concerned. The townsite is open but mind the Indian Department does not deal with all new comers as trespassers.
 A man named Goodenough was up before Judge Hopkins Wednesday on the charge of burglary and larceny. The Judge did not think the testimony good enough to hold Mr. Goodenough and so he thought it would be good enough for the peace and dignity of the territory to have Mr. Goodenough discharged, and he was discharged.
 The prophets who foresaw the death and burial of Eagle Rock have lived long enough to see that town on the highway to success and prosperity. While these prophets were keeping watch over the corpse the people were making canals and ditches and the town-to-day is in the heart of one of the best irrigated districts in the territory. Water is king in Idaho, and Eagle Rock is close to the king.
 A company of capitalists will take out a 40 foot canal from Snake river below Market Lake and run it to the foothills east of Eagle Rock, thence southerly towards Basalt and Blackfoot. Mr. Clark, the engineer, thinks the survey will bring it close to Blackfoot. A survey of 12 1/2 miles has been made, and he has been ordered to extend it 25 miles further. This canal will reclaim all the lands north of Eagle Rock and that fine body of lands lying east of the railroad between Eagle Rock and Basalt.
